BROKEN WAND CEREMONY IN MEMORY OF JOHN WADE MAGICIAN AND FRIEND JULY 20, 1991

John Wade was drawn into our fraternal circle by his interest in the mysteries of Magic, and Art nourished by a fellowship that extends around the globe. But now, he has learned a still deeper secret, one that is withheld from even the greatest of magicians until the day of separation from this life.
